The Disciplinary System of Nineteenth Century American Prisons—A study of the disciplinary records of 12,000 prisoner infractions in two state penitentiaries in Wyoming from 1890 to 1910. The study aims at understanding the social organization of prisoner guards in relation to the institutional meanings of “misbehavior” and “punishment.”

Meanings of Ambivalent Social Relations—Using the Urban Commune Data Set, this study aims at understanding the network consequences of “ambivalent relations”—a pair of commune members who subjectively evaluate their dyadic relations in both positive and negative terms.
